The President's Message

Dear Club Members:

As all of you know, there will be no Sheltie Club meeting for the month of February. The Olympics will be in town, and all the World will be watching. Although the Games present some inconveniences for some of us, and many of us will have to adapt to small changes while they are here, it is overall a great honor for our community to host the World for this fabulous event, one that honors accomplishment, sacrifice, and participation and that encourages a spirit of peace and unity.

I like the Olympic Games for these reasons, that they inspire a certain spirit of friendship and cooperation. I realize that there is a lot of money involved in the whole thing, and a great deal of shameless commercialism, but I think it is cynical to look only at these things. I like to look at the positive side of the games, the positive values it espouses, and I like to think that our small club, too, encourages some of these values, and this spirit, in its members.

As Americans we often hear of the Olympic medal counts, and some of us listen to hear whether our athletes have won any more medals on a particular day, or whether we have more medals as a country than any other country. However, in speaking of the Olympic spirit, the founder of the Modern Olympic Games, Baron Pierre de Coubertin, argued that winning was simply not as important as taking part. Truly, this man recognized the value and importance of participation.

For most of the athletes in the Olympics participating in the Games is the most important part, since most of them by far will certainly not win gold medals. Most of these athletes recognize what an honor it is simply to participate in the Games. All the athletes, I like to think, understand the value of mutual respect for each other, develop friendships at the Games, and seek to improve themselves. I know, too, that we, as Sheltie Club members, can enjoy these same rewards, mutually respecting each other for what each of us brings to the club, developing friendships through working together for common goals, and improving ourselves in the process.

Many of us "compete" in dog shows, some of us "compete" in obedience demonstrations; however, all of us love our dogs, and all of us share this love in common. Just as the Olympic athletes come together from numerous different countries, we come together from many different backgrounds and walks of life. We form friendships meeting and working together, and we gain greater understanding of each other, and from this friendship and understanding we learn to work together cooperatively. In this way, a group of people that might be competitive become cooperative and supportive instead. In my own mind this is how I see the Olympic spirit, and this is what I see working in the Sheltie Club: we participate together, we acknowledge the contributions each of us makes, and the group, the club, benefits from what all of us bring to it.

I hope that those of you who wish to attend part of the Salt Lake Winter Games will have the opportunity to do so, and I hope you enjoy your experience. I hope, too, that all of us will feel in our own hearts the better side of the Olympics, its spirit. And I hope that as Sheltie Club members all of us will continue to give of ourselves and to gain from each other as we work together and enjoy ourselves and our dogs.

Hello!

I'm one of the three ladies responsible for the new "Pets" Spay/Neuter License Plate in Utah that became available January 2, 2002!

The monies from this license plate will go to the one "hole" in the spay/neuter system in Utah; animal control. More animal controls in Utah are proactively adopting animals from their shelters; however, most DO NOT spay/neuter before placement, actually resulting in MORE animals in the shelters or in animal rescue organizations!

The other stipulation of this license plate is that the monies go back to the county in which the license plate was sold; so if you believe in spay/neuter, your purchase will spay/neuter an animal IN YOUR COUNTY, not just this year, but every year!

IN THE SPOTLIGHT



Twincreeks Shelties

Jeff and I married in 1992. For our first anniversary he gave me a puppy. That puppy was "Sir Scott Prance A Lot" our first Sheltie.

Jeff often jokes that this was the biggest mistake he ever made, because this is what started the ball rolling:0) My addiction was born. Scotty is such a smart little guy and I just couldn't seem to get enough of him. I had been dabbling in the conformation ring with an Alaskan Malamute that we owned, and starting to learn the ropes about dog shows in general. I was having a hard time controlling my muscle bound mal. and made a decision to start showing shelties... a breed I was sure would be much easier to handle:0)

Scotty was not going to work, he had been diagnosed with a mild case of DM at 6 months old. This broke my heart. But welcome to the wonderful world of shelties. Living with this situation made me try my hardest to breed the most healthy correct shelties I can. Watching the dog I love deteriorate through the years has been very hard for me. But I am happy to say that he is alive and well, doing great for a 10 year old.

I purchased my second sheltie "Hi-Valley Shadow Dancer CGC" shortly after Scotty was diagnosed and neutered. Shadow went oversized so I placed her in a pet home. I loved everything about Shadow and wanted to get something with a similar pedigree. So I got on a waiting list for a puppy from the same kennel. In the mean time I had met my future sheltie partner and best friend Kim Kirkpatrick who was an obedience instructor at the Pocatello Kennel Club. We hit it off right away and had so many of the same goals in mind so we formed a partnership: o) I was going to show the shelties in conformation and she would work with them in the obedience ring. We were going to co-own and work together to get our goals accomplished.

We purchased 'Hi-Valley Window Smudge" mostly "Kensil and back to Blazer" lines and I started showing her in conformation, meeting lots of other sheltie folks and learning the ropes from anyone who would take the time to show a newbe how to get things accomplished.

Kim and I traveled to our first Nationals out in Spokane Washington. Smudge made the cut in her class and we were thrilled. While there, we saw a stud from Colorado, a "Phantom" son that we thought would cross fault well with Smudge and decided to take the plunge into breeding. We were both nervous new moms when the babies arrived.

This litter produced Kim's boy "Adam" aka "Celestials First Star" 3 points, and my girl "Willow" aka "Twincreeks Will O' The Wind" 12 pts. 1 major. Willow placed 5th in the open sable class at the Nationals in Riverside, CA. this year. We were thrilled with this breeding which is basically our foundation. I'm hoping to get Willow back in the show ring very soon to finish her Championship, she is 4 years old and never looked better. She has been handled by Shannalee W-Michalsky who has been a true friend and a great mentor to me.

I purchased a tri colored boy from Georgia, in 1999 to grow out. He is "Beckwards Chimney Sweep" 11 points both majors. Presently being promoted in CA. His lines go back to the Heritage Spirit stuff that I love as does Willows pedigree. This spring brought me a sable boy "Akadia In Hot Pursuit" "Chase" will be shown very soon. And a 18 month old sable girl from the east coast "Kalyns' Rock This Country", "Shanya" joined the crew this fall, but will not be shown due to an injury she sustained as a puppy, but we are very excited to add her beauty and grace to our breeding program she is by "CH Caitlin Laraedo a "Blazer" son. So you see I am finally to the point that I am putting together the breeding program that I have been dreaming of these past 10 years. It has taken much longer than I first anticipated... one thing I have learned, you have to be patient and persistent in shelties. We hope to have our first & second CH's very soon.

Kim and I started KiMarie Adventures several years ago. We vend at the dog shows to pay for our hobby :0) this has taken us across the country and we were able to participate in the last three Nationals, we have been able to meet and learn from so many wonderful sheltie people. We sell my artwork and many other doggy related gift items which is a whole other story... but we got the name right, it is always an Adventure. Some of my other hobbies are fine arts and crafts, I work part time at a floral shop, and I enjoy skiing. Jeff is an avid hunter, he works for Monsanto as a heavy equipment operator, and his big hobby is his Harley Davidson...so he can't complain about this dog sport being too expensive LOL or I dish it right back at him :0) We both enjoy the outdoors and camping. A continental breakfast & lunch will be provided both days.

This is a three-part seminar:

<u>Saturday 8am – Noon:</u> <u>Introduction to Agility</u>. Perfect for puppies (all shots required) or dogs that have never been on the equipment or need to learn proper methods. Working positions \$60.00 (limit 16).

<u>Saturday Noon – 6pm:</u> Novice Agility. For dogs familiar with equipment and/or getting ready to compete at the Novice level. Working positions \$60 (limit 8)

Sunday: 9am - 5pm: Motivation and Course Handling Strategy

For advanced dogs and handlers actively competing. He'll concentrate on advanced handling and course planning strategy. Working positions \$100 (limit 12)

Working positions are dog/handler teams that will be working with Craig during the session.

Working position prices include unlimited auditing both days.

Audit Positions are unlimited. You may audit Saturday or Sunday: \$30.00 each day or both days \$50.00. Auditors will be encouraged to walk courses and ask questions, but may not bring dogs. Craig recommends that all participants in Session 1 audit Session 2 because there's only so much that can be done with dogs who are not familiar with equipment, but the handlers should be able to understand future training requirements much better by observing session 2. Craig also requires that Session 2 participants audit session 1 (the cost includes both), so they can spend as much time as possible on the equipment without having to be redundant in his presentation of focus, attention, motivation, training philosophy, contacts, weave poles, basic handling techniques, etc. Craig believes that this format for day 1 will maximize the benefits to be gained by all attendees, both working participants and auditors alike.

Please bring your own chair, a dog crate or an X-pen, or plan to leave your dog in the car when you are not actually working with your dog.
