Hello Sheltie Lovers!

I've got an opportunity to make our November meeting really fun!

What would you think about bringing Santa to the meeting and having photographs of you and your dogs done for the holidays?

As you may be aware, Heart Ministries does digital portraiture every year as a fundraiser for their Rescue efforts. They are willing to bring Santa and their entire photo setup to SEPS so that you can have your Christmas pictures done in time for the holidays! Their Santa is especially Sheltie-friendly, and the crew that takes the photographs is professional and cares very deeply about dog expression and photo composition. If you prefer portraits without Santa, that can also be accomplished (in the case of calendars, it's probably appropriate).

These digital portraits can be converted into holiday cards, calendars, TShirts/SweatShirts, and every size photograph you can think of, in any combination! If you are a digital type, you can get the photos put onto a CD or diskette, or for a small fee, a screensaver/cursor/icon/splashscreen set can be made for your computer.

Minimum purchase is one sheet of photographs (same pose) for \$10. Holiday cards are about \$30 for 25 cards/ envelopes. The costs are rather minimal for what you receive (Humane Society is charging \$20 for 2 5x7 photos), and the proceeds go to a very worthy and worthwhile cause (as you may know, Dawn does ALOT of Sheltie and Collie rescue through the Utah Shelters).

In order to secure their offer, we need to have a minimum of fifteen people interested in getting their portraits done. Please email me if you are interested so that we can schedule this wonderful group!

Three Utahn's competed at the AKC Agility Nationals this past weekend against many of the top agility dogs in the country. Although we didn't win, all three of them placed in the top 50% of competing dogs in their jump heights!

Of 118 competitiors In the 16" jump height group, Jeanne Lehan and Yarra were in 48th place after two runs on Saturday, and finished a clean run on Sunday which moved her up to 23rd overall. Lori Wadsworth and Alex were in 50th position after 2 rounds on Saturday and finished in 52nd position overall both finishing ahead of many world team members!

Snickers was the third Utah dog and was in 31st position after his two runs on Saturday, qualifying in both rounds, unfortunately on Sunday, he felt a need to have a discussion with the judge before continuing on, but finished in 56th position overall for the weekend.

For those of you who have joined Utah Dog Events through our website, I'd like to take a moment to introduce ourselves to those of you who aren't familiar with us and our work, as well as invite you to some of our upcoming activities on behalf of the animals!

Heart Ministries, Inc. (a member of No More Homeless Pets Utah) is a private, non-profit animal rescue organization that is dedicated to serving all Utah Animal Shelters, Humane Agencies and Rescue Groups/Individuals in adopting shelter animals into permanent, loving homes. We do this by:

\* Doing outreach programs on behalf of Utah Animal Shelters and Humane Agencies by pulling animals directly from shelter environments and taking them to public venues to be adopted by loving families committed to caring for them the rest of their lives. \* Offering loving, safe foster homes to these displaced shelter animals (which includes specialized medical attention and care) until they can be adopted into a permanent family of their own.

\* On our Adoption Days, we invite the public to come meet shelter & foster animals. We specialize in our adoption program by offering the public two special days: Saturday is "Shelter Day" (in which animals are pulled directly from Utah Animal Shelters); and Sunday is "Rescue Day" (where, by Heart's permission only, rescue groups/individuals bring their rescued shelter fosters).

\* Promoting the spaying and neutering of all pets to help end the extreme pet overpopulation problem by offering information on veterinarians who offer low cost spay/neuters.

\* Works with and counsels individuals and families who are experiencing behavior/training problems with their pets in the hopes of preventing a "family breakup".

Please Note: We work only with the above referenced agencies, and do not have the facilities to assist owners who wish to turn over their animals for adoption. Should anyone need assistance in this area, we invite you to call a HEART volunteer for information on what you can do or who can assist you; or , direct your inquiry to the appropriate shelter or humane agency for this type of assistance. Thank you.

#### Adoption Dates/Times:

Heart will be doing adoptions for November/Early December on the dates listed below:

<u>Cat/Kitten Shelter Outreach Program</u>, November 11th through 15th and November 25th through December 8th at PetsMart on 389 West 1830 South, Salt Lake City (Weekdays by appointment only, Saturdays from 10:00 am to 3:00 p.m. and Sundays from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.).

In addition to the Cat/Kitten Shelter Outreach Program, we will be featuring our <u>Puppy & Dog</u> friends from local animal shelters as well as our foster "children" on Saturday, November 30th, Sunday, December 1st, and December 7th and 8th; also in the Adoption Center at PetsMart on 389 West 1830 South in Salt Lake City. The adoption times again for Saturdays are 10:00 am to 3:00 p.m., and Sundays from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

Interested parties will go through an interview process and notified that any fees charged for adoption purposes cover all spay/neuter and vaccination costs only. Heart is a non-profit organization and no profit is made off of these homeless, needy animals.

### Santa Pictures!

Since Heart is a non-profit rescue, we rely solely on fund-raisers to help us continue our work on behalf of the shelter animals. Rescuing animals require not only shelter, but involve food, litter, vaccinations, and specialized medical care for sick or injured animals. Our favorite fund-raiser always comes this time of year when we are able to offer Santa picture packages for you, your pet and your family (with or without Santa). The dates for this year are: Saturday, November 16th and Sunday, November 17th from 10:00 am to 3:00 p.m. at Willow Creek Dog Training Center, 2055 E. Creek Road (8000 South) in Sandy, Utah. These beautiful, professionally done digital portrait packages not only include portraits in all sizes, but Holiday Cards, calendars, T-shirts and Sweatshirts, and mouse-pads!

We will also be doing Santa Pictures on December 7th and 8th at PetsMart on 389 West 1830 South from 10:00 am to 4:00 p.m. offering Polaroid and digital packages as well!

## **ETHICS**

The dictionary defines ethics as relating to morals and of distinction between right and wrong. Each of us has a code of ethics that guide us in how we make decisions. The decisions that we make determine what our code of ethics are. As breeders we learn our code of ethics from those who get us started in the breed. If we are taught to have a high code of ethics as we begin in our novice years of breeding then the decisions we make later on will be based on a higher plane than those who are not taught to have a high code of ethics. Each of us will base our distinction between right and wrong on the example of those who start us in the breed or sometimes by the articles that we read in our breed magazines. Some seem to have a hard time between what they say and what they actually do. There are many questions that each of us will need to ask ourselves to determine and develop a sense of what is right in the dog breeding game. For example: Do I sell a bitch for breeding that I KNOW is definitely NOT breeding quality? Do I breed my male who I know is producing a hereditary skin disease? Do I not have my dog's hips and eyes checked because it isn't in MY line? What about breeding for money instead of the improvement of the breed having so many litters that you overpopulate the area and then never sell on a spay/neuter agreement. Most of us would gasp and say we would never do such a thing and yet if we really examined our motives I think a lot of times we would see ourselves doing otherwise. I am not trying to point fingers at anyone in particular because I know that we are ALL guilty of doing things that are ethically wrong at some point in our race to produce the ultimate show dog. Let's step back for a moment and look at ourselves the way some of the pet people do who buy our wonderful puppies. What do we teach them if we sell a pet to them with a puppy back instead of a spay agreement and an honest evaluation of the puppy. Do we teach them a to have a high code of ethics? Do we sell them a dog that we know has a physical problem, or not stand behind what we produce when it crops up with something debilitating such a hip displasia, epilepsy or skin disorders. Does this teach them that breeders have a high code of ethics? What about that puppy we sold to someone years ago and now they call back when the dog is 7 yrs of age and tell us that they are getting divorced and can't keep the dog anymore. Do we as the breeder turn our backs on a dog that WE are responsible for bringing into this world. Where is our code of ethics? It is one thing to profess that we have a higher standard than Joe Blow down the street, but how do we perform when we are actually faced with the situation itself. I know personally that I have made mistakes over the 22 years I have been in the dog game. Some of these very situations have cropped up in those years. Some of them I have chosen a high code of ethics on but then occasionally there have been some misses too. I think we all need to examine what our codes of ethics are. Hopefully most of us know what is right and what is wrong, after all we have read enough about what a good code of ethics entails - haven't we? But there is a great need for improvement in this area.

Disclaimer: All of these situations that are mentioned I have seen in my 22 years of breeding. Some I have observed in the "BIG BREEDERS" and some I have observed around in our general area. This article does NOT intend to point fingers at various individuals. HOWEVER if you in reading this article FEEL uncomfortable as if this article was written about YOU, then I would suggest some serious reflection on your part as to YOUR code of ethics.



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
