Vets Corner: Food Allergies

Do you find that your dog frequently vomits, has diarrhea, or shows any skin irritations, bad coat condition and/or hair loss? Any or all of these symptoms could point to allergies, and specifically to an allergy to your dog food. Ingredients in food that your dog cannot tolerate any result in a variety of negative reactions. Allergy and food intolerance is also called an adverse reaction to food and can create ongoing problems with both the skin and digestive tract. There are many possible causes for these food allergies. However, some of the ingredients that cause most of the problems are frequently found in most common pet foods.

In dogs, the most common causes of adverse reactions are beef, dairy products, wheat, chicken and pork. Beet pulp can also be a cause for concern.

It may take months or years before a pet develops an allergic response to a particular food. However, once an adverse reaction begins with a certain

always be allergic to that food source. Because adverse reactions to food are most commonly associated with protein sources, your dog may need to be fed a protein source that he has not eaten before. Through the process of elimination, it may be discovered that your dog is allergic to many protein sources and will need a food with specially broken down proteins. Some "novel" sources of protein now available are egg, duck, salmon, whitefish, even kangaroo! Finding the right food to suit your

dogs needs can be very important!

Well this trip back from Lewiston, Id with my 33 ft Pace Arrow motorhome

and all those fancy bells and whistles, really topped one of my many adventures I've traveled with friends, Doug and mainly myself for twenty years showing shelties and collies all over the country!

Everyone has heard about our adventure to the 2001 Nationals with Julene Mathews, Cindy Wilkenson, Joan Parsley and Myself. But this past week tops them all!

One leaves the beautiful Interstate just outside Ontario, Ore and you travel Highway 95 to Lewiston, Id with breathtaking scenery, fishing villages (salmon) on an incredible river. The bain of all travelers who haul trailers and drive motor homes is the rugged climbs and descents. About seventy miles south of Lewiston is the White Feather Pass. We did great in low gear and I pictured myself driving stakes into the ground to make sure I was still moving.

A turtle pace going but got me to the top. Great, no overheating this trip!

Now I know you've figured out, ok so she has to come home this way too. Well, yes, I perused using all kinds of directions to get home, trying to avoid this grade, especially since we had just replaced all the brakes and rotors on our 33 ft beast.

The general consensus by all seasoned dog show folk was go back the same way.

I decided better safe than sorry and decided to leave Tuesday morning having dumped all the water. I followed advice by watching the RPMs and staying off the brakes.

> I had stalled the downgrade I was now looking down the throat of. Outside of Graysville, we climbed a grade that warned truckers to test brakes. Then a 7% downgrade for eight miles after that. I crested the hill and the panoramic view of

the Marydale wilderness and Craters of the Earth. My heart skipped, I dropped to a lower gear and ...down I went. I was cool the first turn at 35 mph. I was going good at the straitaway with a couple of sharp turns and seven miles to go. I tapped my brakes, then uh oh, 45 mph, the sign said 35. Well, things were getting

tougher and I was getting worried.

A C.W. McCall song came to my mind "Wolf Creek Pass" about the telephone poles slipping by mu-

litplied by 5. It was about his harrowing drive down Wolf Creek and pulls into Pagona Springs. I was worried to say the least.

My brakes were getting mushy and I saw smoke. I had four miles to go. I decided to try to calm myself and get off the road. The turnout was the White Feather overlook of a battlefield across the way but I couldn't get there due to traffic coming up too heavy. I decided I had to pull off! Marq has instructed at two Clean Run Camps and at two Power Paws Camps and has conducted multiple seminars on his own. As an instructor, he concentrates on improving the handler's course strategy and positioning. Marq emphasizes accuracy, consistency and speed with a confident and upbeat handling style.

Marq discovered dog sports in the 80's in obedience where he earned a CDX on a shy one-eyed rescue sheltie and a UD on another Sheltie. In '94, Marq's wife, Rebecca, urged him to try the new sport of agility. He's been a student of the game ever since. Marq became an AKC judge in 1996 and judged at the first AKC FCI Invitational in 2000.

Marq is a frequent writer in the monthly <u>Clean Run</u> agility magazine with featured articles on course strategy and training. His articles include course handling analyses on the AKC national events and at the annual FCI Agility World Championships. You may have seen Marq, Rebecca and their Shelties as featured in a one-half hour Animal Planet show called PET STORY.

In "98, his Sheltie 'Wyatt' earned his US-DAA Championship (ADCH) before he was three and finished the year in the Top Ten of all four USDAA National in 1998 and fourth overall in 2000.
