

#### Sheltie Rescue of Utah in 2002

Congratulations to the members of USSA! With your generous support, Sheltie Rescue of Utah was able to

rescue 19 Shelties in 2002. We could not have accomplished this without the many ways in which USSA members contribute their time, energy, donations, and their hearts to Sheltie Rescue.

As breeders, exhibitors, and lovers of Shetland Sheepdogs, USSA members have recognized and responded to the need to rescue unwanted Shelties and Sheltie mixes that we find throughout Utah and surrounding states.

#### Status of Our 501(c)(3) Application

With the generous help of the law firm of Froerer and Miles, and with appreciation to Marie Miles, we are just about ready to become a Utah nonproft corporation. With this designation, we can apply for our federal 501 (c) (3) designation, which will probably not occur until June or July. Recognition as a 501 (c) (3) charitable organization will mean that all donations to Sheltie Rescue of Utah will be tax deductible.

#### Income and Expenses

Income for Sheltie Rescue of Utah in 2002 was about \$2,052.00. Expenses for 2002 were about \$8,069.15 and includes veterinary care, food (including specialized diets such as bland diets for sensitive tummies, weight reduction diets for over-

weight Rescues, etc.), treats, greenies, chewies, toys, dental and grooming supplies, crates, shelter fees, supportive crate pads, and beds. Veterinary care includes spay/neuter, vaccinations, worming, microchipping, senior blood panels as needed, orthopedic evaluations, dental work (most of our Rescues over the past year have needed dental care — some needing quite significant work) as well as antibiotics, antiinflammatory and other medications which are
