Annie's Story by Tricia Harris

I have been asked a couple of times to write the story of Annie's death after the birth of her litter. I guess I have resisted for a couple of reasons; first it is a painful subject for me and second I wasn't sure what the lesson to be learned is.

Annie came to me through the incredibly selfless gift of Don Bickford, and because of the support and help of Cheryl Sorensen. I brought Annie home with me at the same time I picked up a new puppy. I was really concerned that I wouldn't be able to help her overcome her shyness while fussing over a new puppy, but believe it or not Annie is the one that won our hearts. She filled our home with love and we all became deeply attached to her. Many of you saw Annie in the show ring and saw how completely frightened she was there. Although I think she was improving some, she never liked the ring. But she was a different girl in our home. She was everyone's best friend here, and won the hearts of all of us.

We bred Annie shortly after the Logan specialty, and looked forward with great anticipation to the puppies. I was so excited that as the birth approached I gathered everything I thought I could possibly need from oxytocin to esbilac. Annie's temp was taken every 8 hours for the last ten days of her pregnancy. Her temperature finally dropped on Saturday July 26th about noon. I was full of excitement and went about the final preparations for the coming birth. Annie showed some signs of pre labor about 6 PM Saturday evening. I stayed up with her the entire night Saturday night, but she had not progressed to hard labor by morning. I continued my vigil through the day on Sunday until she finally started showing signs of visible contractions about 3 PM Sunday afternoon. I had read and reread almost all of my many Pacesetters and Internationals while quietly keeping an eye on her. Her water broke at about 3:45 Sunday afternoon and I patiently waited for her first puppy to appear. She continued to have contractions without delivering puppy and my concern began to grow. By 6 PM I checked for her cervical dilation with a gloved finger, and found that she was completely dilated and I could feel a puppy way up high. There didn't seem to be anything blocking that puppy but it was not moving down with her contractions. I contacted my vet and advised him on the problem, on his advice I gave her 2 shots of oxytocin 15 minutes apart. The shots did make her contractions harder, but did not produce a puppy, so I called the vet again. The vet came to my home where he checked her and said that the puppy was too big and would never be delivered naturally so we decided on a c-section.

I rushed Annie to the vet hospital Sunday early evening. We were still all excited to have the puppies finally on their way. I and my neighbor Diana went along to help dry off puppies. Annie vomited just before we left for the vet, but since she hadn't eaten much for 2 days while in Labor, it was just some vellow liguid. At the vet's office, Annie was put under anesthesia then placed on the surgical table on her back and prepared for surgery. I was asking all kinds of questions. Being a Nurse I wondered about everything, but was especially concerned about the difference in her breathing and the paleness of her color. I have to admit that I haven't ever seen a dog under anesthesia like this before and wasn't sure what was normal. Just as the vet finished preparing her abdomen for the incision he looked up at her and noticed that she had almost quit breathing. He pulled her on to her side and began resuscitating her. She had aspirated her own vomit and was nearly dead. As he began CPR on her, my heart hit the floor. I figured all the puppies and Annie were dead. The vet worked very hard to revive her, and after what seemed like forever he was able to get her breathing again. He intubated her (put a tube in her trachea to help her breathe) and put her on high flow oxygen. He then went ahead and prepared her abdomen again for the incision and began the surgery. By now she had been under anesthesia for a long time and the babies were really at risk both by the anesthesia and by the lack of oxygen during her respiratory and cardiac arrest. I wasn't expecting a very good outcome at this point. The vet delivered 3 puppies. 2 of them took a lot of work to get any response from. As the vet handed them over he said he didn't think there was much hope for them. We worked very hard for a long time and were able to get all three to breathe and respond. Annie was sewed up and allowed to wake up. She was having a great deal of difficulty breathing from the start. I brought her and the puppies home with me that night.

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It was getting late when we got home. I made her as comfortable as I could. She was in so much distress that she was unable to acknowledge or bond with her puppies. She was in too much distress to even try to nurse them. I stayed up for the second night to watch and feed Annie's babies. I made Annie as comfortable as I could on a blanket by my bed, where she wanted to be. I lay down beside her to hold her through one of the longest nights of my life. The next morning she was in so much distress that I got to the vet's office before he did. When he came in he started to try to help her breathe easier. He worked on her for a while, but within the hour she took her last breath and finally let her body relax.

My beautiful bi blue girl was gone. I held her tight and told her it was alright to go, and that I would take care of her babies. Her little heart finally gave out, she relaxed and was gone.

I am pleased to say that through grace of God I was able to hand raise her babies on a bottle. They are all alive and very healthy beautiful babies. You will meet her bi black son Lacewood Star Maker "Draco" in the ring soon. Draco is co owned with Don Bickford and Cheryl Sorensen.

Annie will always have a special place in my heart and the hearts of my family. We loved her dearly. Her picture hangs on my wall. We cherish her babies and I have done my best to keep my promise to her to take the best care of them I can.

If there is a lesson to be learned, I guess it is we never know how long we will have our cherished furkids. Making the decision to have a litter, comes with excitement and much joy, but also comes with risks. --Tricia Harris--

Mormon Muffins Help needed please!

MORMON MUFFINS

| 2 cups boiling water | 1 Tbl + 2 tsp baking soda |
|--------------------------|---------------------------|
| 1 cup shortening | 2 cups sugar |
| 4 eggs | 1 qt Buttermilk |
| 5 cups all purpose flour | 1 tsp salt |
| 4 cups 100% Bran Buds | 2 cups 40% Bran Flakes |
| 1 cup chopped walnuts | |

Add soda to hot water & let cool. Whip shortening & Sugar until light & fluffy. Add the eggs slowly & beat Well. Add buttermilk, flour & salt & mix well. Add The soda water very slowly. Fold the two bran cereals Into the mixture very slowly; add the chopped walnuts.

To bake, spoon into greased or paper lined muffin Tins. Bake at 350 for 18 minutes. Makes 4 dozen Recipe from The Greenery Restaurant, world famous for their Mormon Muffins.

We want all the Club members to have this so hopefully they will make a batch or two & give them to Cindy Workman for the welcome reception. The muffins don't need frosting at all, so they could be frozen until Sunday morning, then given to Cindy. Anyway, thanks much!!! Caren

One of the saddest situations we encounter is when a family falls on hard times and can no longer afford to care for their Sheltie or even keep their home. They are torn and heartbroken but see no alternative to giving up their Sheltie. This was the case with Dewey's family. Their lives had been turned upside down and they were very reluctantly leaving the state in their

search for jobs for both husband and wife.

At $7\frac{1}{2}$ years old, a shy and reserved Dewey was looking for a new home. This would be his third "permanent" home.

On arrival it was apparent that Dewey was having dental problems, but we never imagined the extent of those problems. Our new Sheltie Rescue boy was not neutered and, we discovered, was inclined to leave his "mark" throughout our home. That little habit would have to go!

Like many new arrivals, Dewey was uncertain and insecure. Most of his time was spent under the kitchen table. That was okay with us for awhile but we would be watching to see how and when we could help him integrate into our family life, socialize with us, and play with the other dogs. As it turned out, socializing with the other dogs came more easily to Dewey than socializing with us!

After a thorough physical exam, including a blood profile and urinalysis, Dewey was neutered and

had a dental done at the same time. We were astonished to learn that fourteen teeth had to be removed. Some of the larger teeth that are usually difficult to remove, came out of Dewey with hardly any effort at all. Other teeth were so loose our vet was surprised that they hadn't already fallen out. Dewey must have been silently suffering with a great deal of pain in his mouth, making meals and eating a somewhat torturous task.

It was gratifying to watch Dewey blossom after recuperating from his surgery. With great enthusiasm, Dewey learned to chew food, biscuits, and greenies with his remaining teeth. As time passed, that enthusiasm grew into a non-stop song that began with the food preparation for each of his meals and ended only when his bowl of food was placed in front of him.

Jim and I learned how to give treats and Dewey, how to get treats from our fingers without the usual front teeth to help out. Dewey experimented with getting treats from my fingers using his gums and applying just enough pressure to acquire the treat, but not enough to hurt me. Bit by bit, Dewey began hanging out with us and seeking affection rather than living under the table.

Then Lily arrived! Lily was found during a huge snowstorm in December, barely alive, on a front doorstep. She's somewhere between 11 and 13 years old. But best of all, from Dewey's perspective, Lily was never spayed! Dewey was head-over-heels, couldn't-stop-salivating in love with a capital "L"! If he was under the table at all it was to watch Lily nearby. Dewey couldn't help but follow this little girl wherever she went. Dewey had his own special dance that he performed only for Lily — Dewey had totally come to life!

Lily , a very social girl, didn't hesitate to tell Dewey which of his antics she liked and which she didn't like at all. Lily "coached" him often until Dewey settled down and behaved like a proper Sheltie-boyfriend. Lily liked to wave a toy in front of Dewey and then lay down and start chewing on one end of it. Dewey would lay down next to her and chew on the other end of the toy -a very happy pair.

One day an Application for Adoption arrived with a note attached. The note asked about meeting Dewey if he was still available. We were excited that someone was interested in Dewey but wary as to why they were drawn to him in particular. We felt Dewey would have the best chance of reaching his full potential in a home, like the applicant's home, without competition from other dogs. But we also felt very protective of him. Dewey would only be placed in a home where he

would be loved and cherished for who he is, for the rest of his life.

Over the course of several telephone interviews, I became aware that Norie and Mike were a sensitive, caring, and patient couple. Just the kind of family I'd hoped to find for Dewey.

Norie and Mike had lost their Sheltie to cancer several months earlier. They wanted another Sheltie, but needed

time to grieve their loss. Unbeknownst to us, Norie was visiting our website regularly to see who was available. She was immediately drawn to Dewey but wasn't ready to adopt just yet. Each time she visited our website and saw Dewey, she became more and more interested in meeting him. When she was finally ready to consider an adoption, Norie sent us her Application for Adoption and that note, asking about Dewey.

We were surprised to see how readily Dewey approached Norie and Mike on their first visit. This was the same Sheltie we had to coax out from under an end table with chicken and American cheese when he arrived at our home several months earlier. We were even more surprised when we saw that Dewey was more strongly drawn to Mike than to Norie. Dewey always seemed to feel safer with females. We were told that their previous Sheltie, who was originally Norie's dog, also was strongly drawn to Mike and that every pet they encounter reacts to Mike in this same way.

The feelings between Norie, Mike, and Dewey were clearly mutual. We couldn't have been happier. The following week, Dewey went home with Norie and Mike to start his new life.

We miss Dewey. But we continue to be surprised with Dewey's

progress in our weekly follow-ups. When he hears the garage door open, Dewey goes to greet Mike while keeping on eye on Norie. He greets visitors and welcomes them to *hi*s home. Best of all, Dewey doesn't spend any time under the kitchen table anymore.

West Nile Virus


