I just got home from the emergency vet. I gave my dogs each a "roverolis," a new Snausage treat. My dog Scooter's got stuck in his throat. He was trying to cough it back up, but couldn't. I picked him up and held him upside down, hoping gravity would help. I stuck my finger down his throat several times. I could feel it but couldn't get close enough to get under it. He starts vomiting. I hold him upside down so he doesn't aspirate on his vomit. He is still heaving trying to dislodge it, I'm hitting his back, holding him upside down, his tongue starts turning blue. I grab him off the counter, grab my purse, jump in my car and race to the vet. I called Donna on the way and asked her to call the emergency vet to let them know I was bringing in a choking dog. She actually went there and notified them. I get there, jump out of the car, run in, they grab him, the vet comes running in and says his entire tongue is blue, we have to knock him out now so we can get it out. I said do whatever you need to do, I'll pay for it. The vet came in and told me that I was very very lucky. She said Scooter would have died. She said the only thing that kept him alive was that he was so calm during everything. She also said that he was the second dog that had come in recently that had had this treat get lodged in its throat/windpipe. She said Scooter was lucky, the other dog wasn't. Scooter is now in ICU, he's getting antibiotics intravenously, and has to spend the night there. Hopefully he can come home tomorrow. I almost lost him I rarely buy my dogs this type of treat.

Tricia Harris — Lacewood Shetland Sheepdogs

Tell us how you got into shelties.

Like many of us, I started out in love with Lassie. I didn't even know what Shelties were until the mid 1970s. I got my first sheltie, Dusty, shortly after leaning about them. She was just a pet that I got from Melva Ward. I loved her dearly and thought she was the perfect dog!!


How did you come to start showing dogs?

I moved to Salt Lake City soon after acquiring my first sheltie. At that time I had Dusty's daughter, Shellee, and decided to take an obedience class. I started training with the Great Salt Lake Dog Training Club. I was hooked after my first class and became really interested in obedience. I trained Shellee to her UD, and another sheltie I got from Bev Danvers, Misty, to a CDX. I also taught many classes for the Great Salt Lake Dog Training

Club. Misty was a Ch. Banchory High Born granddaughter. Although she was a color headed white, getting her and my association with Bev gave me a great desire to show dogs in

conformation. I spent many many hours at Bev's house while she

groomed dogs. We talked about shelties, and she patiently taught me to recognize a good sheltie. We went over dogs all the time and she allowed me to put my hands on many good qualities as well as dogs that were not so



What dogs have inspired you?

Misty

In the early days of my "dog life", I was in love with

Pow, "Ch. Cherden's Sock It To 'Em". I loved Deep Purple and Backstop. I sent bitches to be bred with Ch. Harvest Hill Shoeshine Boy, and Ch. Killybeg Prince of Darkness. I loved all of these dogs. The Banchory and Summersong dogs had the look I loved, with all that wonderful bone and muzzle. They possessed the chiseled head that I longed to achieve. Today there are so many dogs that I admire that there are too many to mention. I feel like the wonderful dogs are more spread around now than they were years ago. I think that may have come about because those very large





breeding kennels no longer exist. The quality of the dogs in Utah has improved a lot as well. I'm very impressed with the dogs that we have in our own little club.

Who has made an impact on you as a breeder/exhibitor?

Well first, like I mentioned before, Bev Danvers helped me so much to develop an eye for shelties. She was my first mentor and I will be forever grateful to her for the many hours she spent teaching me about shelties. Cheryl Sorensen also helped me to learn and develop. When I first came back into shelties it was like starting all over again. It took awhile for me to know the bloodlines that had come while I was away, and to see shelties from today's perspective. Cheryl gave me encouragement and help to start on my way. Ernie and Caren Ciampini



also gave me a hand in the very beginning. I will always be grateful to their encouragement as I began my journey back. Don Bickford of Roydon shelties was very influential to my

breeding program. He was truly my mentor until he passed away a while back. He trusted two different bitches with me and helped to guide my way of looking at the dogs. I will be forever grateful to him for all he did to help me.

There are many other sheltie breeders out there that have also influenced me. I love what Shannalee is

doing and I think she excels as an exhibitor as well. She always has dogs that show well and are immaculately groomed. There are just too many to mention them all!

How did you come up with your kennel name?

Originally I bred under the kennel name of Silvertip Shelties. I lived on Silvertip Lane in Salt Lake City and it sounded like a fun kennel name. I mostly bred AOACs so the Silvertip name went well. When I got married my husband felt like Silvertip really left him out, so we searched for another kennel name that would suit both of us. He is a very accomplished wood worker and loves exotic woods. Lacewood is just that, a really pretty exotic wood. I loved the sound of the name and it brings in the exotic woods that he loves. So Lacewood was born even before I got Brock.

How many litters do you breed and how do you handle whelping and breeding?

I only breed one or two well planned litters per year. I don't have a large quantity of puppies, and actually have a list of people looking for puppies that I try to keep up to date. I actually refer most of the people that contact me off to others that I know have puppies. Many of my puppies have gone out of state. I have a cute little show quality puppy in Florida, and have puppies in Tennessee and Washington state.

I really enjoy looking at pedigrees and mapping out my litters on paper and then try to find a boy that will match the pedigree I am looking for that has the qualities I want. Litters are whelped in my bedroom where I can watch over the little guys very closely for the first week or two. The breedings that I do here are done either naturally or AI depending on the circumstances. Visiting bitches have their own dog yard that is double fenced to prevent any chance of escape.

How does your dog hobby interact with the rest of your life?

I feel that being into dogs as much as I am right now is my life! It is difficult to separate my life from my dogs. My dogs are all allowed in the house and they all have time with me each day. They are a big part of my life. They interfere to a degree with how easy it is to leave and go on vacation. I have to hire someone to come in and take care of them. Some of my children enjoy the dogs and they are a big help in socializing puppies and help with part of the general care of the

dogs. It will really change when the children are gone as they are the best puppy socialization tools I have!!

What are your greatest accomplishments and your goals?

A red letter day was the day I put Draco's first points on him myself from the

bred by class. He is my first Home bred champion. That was the day that Brock also finished his championship. He is my first Champion. The day that Brock took a Best of Breed over Zak Attack, who is the #1 dog in the nation was pretty fun. Also the day Draco finished will always stand out as a great accomplishment. It is always fun to win, but I have found that in every show there are a lot of people there all hoping to win. They have each spent a lot of money getting there and only one bitch and one dog will walk away with points that day. The odds are against us at any given



show. So the greatest accomplishments I have had are the friendships I have made while showing dogs. Those are the "winnings" I will cherish most throughout my life. Waiting to earn points is a very disappointing sometimes frustrating venture, but meeting and having good friends is a constant that can be enjoyed at each and every event.

Parting Thoughts?

I love this breed. Shelties are such good dogs. I can't think of any place I'd rather be than surrounded by my dogs. I hope I never lose sight of the fact that the



love of my dogs and the friendship of other exhibitors and breeders are the most important part of this hobby.



I Have a Question....


This Month's Question:

RECIPE OF THE MONTH: Dog Cookies

- 3 Cups whole wheat flour
- 2 small cans dog food or cat food
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 to 2 Cups liquid (I make sure it isn't too dry or too wet so you may have to make your own judgment as to how much liquid to use. You want it the consistency of cookie dough.
- I also use left over gravy or broth as the liquid)



Pre Heat oven to 375 degrees. Stir together all ingredients and drop by spoonful on to greased cookie sheet. Bake for 12-14 minutes. These can be stored in refrigerator or frozen.

After these cookies are cooled down I cut them into small pieces with kitchen shears then put them in freezer bags and store in the refrigerator.

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Sheltie Education

An Article of Interest for Sheltie Owners

Three Inches

Tomorrow on their six-week "birthday," the puppies in our newest Sheltie litter will take turns standing on the grooming table for their first official measurements. We've been evaluating this litter informally since birth—head detail, eye shape, length of hock, tail set, angulation, temperament. And now size.

But size is not just another trait. It's one for which our standard mandates a narrow three-inch range, beyond which a dog is disqualified from breed-ring competition. Tomorrow's measurements, and those of the next few weeks, will determine which of several promising puppies will be "grown out" as show prospects and which will go as pets. Already, my experienced eye tells me that one puppy is definitely heading oversize and another will likely be too small.

A variety of breeds, from Collies to toys, contributed to the Sheltie gene pool. As a result, size—particularly oversize—continues to be a major challenge to breeders. Height is a polygenetic (multi-gene) trait of moderate to high heritability, which means it should respond to direct selection. But are breeders really practicing direct selections for size? And what does "direct selection" actually mean?

Direct selection for size should mean choosing breeding animals only from within the range of allowable heights—in particular, not breeding oversize bitches. A hallmark of polygenetic traits is their susceptibility to environmental influences, and an individual's sex is a primary environmental influence on adult size. Identical "size genes" will produce more size in an environment of male hormones than in an environment of female hormones. This means that male and female Shelties with the same "size genes" will likely have adult heights differing by a half-inch or more, with males being taller. Breeders are much more likely to breed from a non-finished, or non-finishable, bitch than dog, but we thwart our best size-control efforts with every "otherwise lovely" 16-and-a-half-inch brood bitch, who is, at a minimum, the genetic equivalent of a 17-inch male.

Direct selection for size should mean choosing breeding animals that run the full gamut of allowable heights. Thanks to the science of population genetics, we know that polygenetic traits are "normal distributed" around a "population mean." This means that if we were to plot heights for the entire Sheltie population, we would end up with a bell-shaped graph with a high midpoint representing the population's average, or mean, height. Ninety-six percent of the population will have heights within a relatively small area stretching from just below to just above the mean—for Shelties, probably a three- to four-inch range.

From a practical standpoint, this means that if we want most adult Shelties to measure between 13 and 16-inches, the average height of our breeding population should be 14-and-a-half inches. Unfortunately, the true average is probably at least an inch taller. Rarely does one breed a bitch under 14-and-a-half inches, and the vast majority of stud dogs are over 15 inches.

Our breeding decisions are at least partially influenced by what is winning, and this means judges could play a big part in helping us do more to control size. Wicketing dogs that appear oversize is an excellent start, but it's only a start. If we breeders should use the full allowable height range, judges should choose winners from the full range as well.

Our standard does not specify an ideal size, nor does it differentiate between the heights of dogs and bitches. Dogs must appear masculine, bitches feminine, but all else being equal, a 14-inch male is as correct as one measuring two inches taller. Breeders need to keep and breed good small Shelties—especially smaller males, who have "smaller size genes" than identically sized bitches—but that won't happen until breed judges put aside their own preferences and start giving equal consideration to correct dogs of every allowable size.
