#### **Doggie Paddle Do's and Don'ts**

Jumping into the water is a great way for your dog to cool off, especially on hot, steamy days. Swimming can also be a great everyday activity, since it's easy on the joints, but never force it on your pup if he isn't a fan of the water. If he is, always be cautious of water quality, and don't let him drink from the pool, lake, stream, or ocean. Swallowing too much salt water or chlorine can very quickly make your dog sick. Keep a close eye on him while he's paddling around, and help him steer clear of deep waters and strong currents.

We all breed and show dogs for reasons but rarely do we really have a chance to dig down deep into the root of the importance of what we do and have a new found passion for it. thews made with help from Cheryl Sorensen. Everyone loved them!!! Tom said they set the bar on the lunches he has had for his seminars. Here is one of the recipes that Julene used. This was lunch on the Saturday — MMMMMMM We are all still dreaming about it!!!

Cranberried Chicken Salad Croissants by Better recipes.com

3-3 1/2 lbs Chicken breasts cooked and chopped or finely shredded
20 oz dried cranberries
12 oz blanched and slivered almonds toasted
6-8 stalks of celery chopped fine
3 tsp granulated garlic
1 1/2 tsp ground cumin (I don't like cumin that much so I didn't use this)
1 tsp leaf thyme (I used dried ground)
3 tsp old bay seasoning
1 tsp granulated onion
3 pinches salt
20 grinds fresh black pepper
2 tbs Dijon mustard
1/3 gallon whole egg mayonnaise

12 large bakery croissants

#### Directions

In large mixing bowl, combine shredded chicken, and remaining ingredients except croissants. Using gloved hands, mix well and incorporate all ingredients and aid in the additional shredding and breaking up of chicken. Add less mayonnaise to make this dish light and with less fat. Add more mayonnaise if the mixture is not holding when gently compressed. Try not to overpower the dish with too much mayonnaise, however the mayonnaise will keep the dish moist and flavorful. Slice Croissants 3/4 way through to create a pocket. Scoop spoonfuls of mixture into opening fluffing and gently compressing to create a nice visual look inside the croissant. Slice Croissant diagonally in half and serve with Cole Slaw or Potato Salad if desired. Serves 12

#### **Two Colored Fruit Gazpacho**

by Andrew Weil and Rosie Daley and obtained from Bordersstores.com

1 1/2 pints fresh raspberries (about 3 1/2 cups)
20 ounces packaged unsweetened frozen raspberries, defrosted
3 tablespoons sugar
16 ounces lime-flavored sparkling water
6 fresh mint leaves, cut into thin strips
5 kiwi fruits, peeled
2-3 tablespoons freshly squeezed lime juice
1 cup finely diced honeydew melon
1 cup finely diced cantaloupe

Process the raspberries and sugar in a food processor until they are smooth. Strain the raspberry puree through a colander to trap the seeds and transfer it to a big bowl. Add the sparkling water and mint and stir.

Process the Kiwis and the lime juice in the food processor until smooth. Pour equal amounts of the raspberry puree into each of 6 small, chilled soup bowls. Pour equal amounts of the kiwi-lime juice puree in the middle of the raspberry puree in each of the 6 bowls. Sprinkle equal amounts of the honeydew melon and cantaloupe into each soup bowl.

#### serves 6

OK, now the news...when you make it, you will note, it will be different slightly. the flavors were there but I kind of mucked it up a bit and just made it work. The gazpacho would have been pretty in glass, but, alas, who's going to hunt down, and wash 36 bowls...not me...AND, I should have mixed the 7 up with the raspberry puree before putting into the cups...ok, and then, there was the extra berries I didn't want to waste, so I put a spoonful of them into the bottoms of the cups, which I personally liked. OK, then there was the problem of not being able to find any lime flavored sparkling water so I substituted the seven up. Oh, I also used mixed blackberries, raspberries and blueberries instead of just raspberries. So, when you make it, then it will be sooo pretty and taste even better! Have fun!

#### The salad was just a Chicken Caesar salad.

Romaine lettuce cut into strips grated parmesan cheese croutons cooked chopped chicken Kraft classic Caesar dressing. ground black pepper to taste

Don't put ingredients together until you are ready to serve it. Toss all the ingredients together including dressing and serve.

Classic Caesar is made with Anchovies and the dressing is typically made with egg yolk. You got the easy one without the Anchovies.

Enjoy and thanks everyone for your nice compliments. My head won't fit through the door, I hope you're happy. By the way, I found out after the seminar that we had a Cordon Bleu trained Chef in our presence!!! WHAT??? I nearly fainted. And I am sooooo glad we didn't do the Pizza and hoagies routine.

(At our last club meeting Julene Matthews gave an excellent presentation on grooming our dogs. She gave everyone a handout with excellent suggestions on it. That handout is reprinted here with her permission)

## Grooming for a healthy dog

#### Start from the inside out!

- Feed a healthy diet
- Avoid treats and food with simple sugars and processed starch products
- Be mindful of your dogs specific health needs and issues which may effect skin, coat, eye's, bones and organs!
- Proper exercise is as important for your dog as yourself!
- Keep your dog on their medicine regimens. Treat your dog with medical requirements as directed by your Veterinarian. Consistency is very important.
- Just as you need to brush your teeth, their teeth need brushing as well. Brush each day.

#### Maintain a healthy environment!

- Regular cleaning of your dogs environment can avoid problems brought on by parasites and diseases effecting your dogs health.
- Veterinarians will generally discourage allowing dogs or cats sleeping in bed with humans to avoid transference of parasites and disease to people. They should sleep in their own bed which you can wash regularly.

#### Be aware of what is normal for your dog.

From puppy on, traits which are specific to your dog should be known by you and noted. This important habit can help you catch signs of early disease and draw your attention to anything which is unusual and be a barometer for illness, behavior problems related to health and help you get your dog the help they need in time!

#### Bathing and brushing thoroughly is a good start.

- **Use a shampoo which matches your dogs health issues and age**. Puppies for example need puppy shampoo, a dry climate may benefit your dog with an oatmeal shampoo, be familiar with potential allergies and use a shampoo which matches your dogs needs.
- **Blow dry while brushing if possible**. If not, get used to line brushing and pay attention to every square inch of your dogs skin so you find moles, warts, cysts, parasites, injuries, infections, tumors. Don't rush over the dog with a brush and call it good. You may miss what may have saved his life to find!
- Learn the proper technique for checking the anal gland and expressing the anal gland if needed. Some dogs may have need of this while others may never need this done. They should not feel over full. Don't get too aggressive with the procedure, you can potentially rupture a gland if you squeeze too hard. If in question, don't do it before asking for help to learn.

#### Start at the end of his nose.

- Start at the end of his nose and pay attention! Observe for anything unusual such as a nasal discharge which may be abnormal (like green discharge, or a bloody nose).
- **Go on to check his teeth,** look at every one, including back molars, inside and out, looking for infections, exposed nerves or fractures which can become infected, this can cause serious problems with the dog effecting weight, kidneys, heart, liver, eye's, even cause the dog to go into kidney failure! More dogs die from bad teeth than any other chronic canine disease. Gums should be pink, not red, and seal over the teeth without tarter evident. Their tongue should have good color, pink, not blue. Their breath shouldn't smell foul.
- **Check his eye's for discharge**, redness, irritations, growths, cloudiness, squinting, bulging out, or lack of response from the pupil.
- **Check ears for odors, discharge**. Clean waxiness out with a canine ear cleaner. Don't go any further into the ear than what you can see. Carefully clean around notches in ear with cotton but don't poke things into the ear. If you can't reach something you feel needs to come out, ask for help from a Vet or Groomer.
- Run your hands over the dogs neck, down over the back, shoulders, hips, chest, check for any irregularities on skin or under the skin. Check for discharges in both males and females from reproductive organs which may indicate infections. It is normal for unneutered males to have a discharge, however, copious amounts or a foul smell associated with infection should not be present.
- Trim nails and check feet for signs of injuries, noxious weeds which may cause infections, burns caused by chemicals or cold and heat, growths, or unusual wear. Note: If a dog is wearing unusually uneven while other nails are longer, it is a good indication that there is a problem somewhere. The dog is likely experiencing pain somewhere and is compensating by bearing more weight on the healthy leg. Check knee's, hips, spine, as well as hock joints. Systematically eliminate possible problems causing the dog to shift his weight off of a painful area.
- **Observe for discolored areas on coat** which may indicate things such as eye problems if there is excessive brown tear staining. Brown stains on feet can indicate food or environmental allergies. Lick stains are usually seen on joints which are painful. If moles or growths are bothering a dog, they will lick at them causing a stained area over the coat. This needs to be addressed because it can become an obsessive compulsive lick problem which can turn into lick granulomas which are open sores on a dog which can go clear to the bone. The nerve endings are damaged when excessive licking occurs and the dog causes a never ending cycle of damage caused by licking.
- **Observe their movement when done.** Have fun watching but watch for limping, or behaviors not normal for them.

Remember, that a beautiful and healthy dog begins with careful observation and consistent care . Early prevention and treatment is much easier on everyone and far easier to find with a regular and thorough grooming plan.

# I Have a Question....

*This Month's Question:* Do you think males or females make better pets? Which sex do you recommend to people?

Yes, that is, I think that it depends far more on the individual dog than on the dog's sex. There are pros and cons for either sex, but I've found that the negatives are reduced when the dog is spayed or neutered, thus emphasizing

the positives. I've had the most incredible, loving, smart, confident dogs who were males and who were females. Overall, I haven't developed any preference at all.

As far as which sex I recommend to others. Here, it depends on the specific personalities of the people and the dogs. When pressed, I suggest to people that females have the advantages that they are less likely to mark (and not very high at that), they're more protective (especially of kids), and that they are sometimes inclined to help run the household. By contrast, males are often sweeter, more cuddly, and less likely to decide that they're in charge of discipline in the house. Jim Melton

I discuss with a potential home the difference in sexes from my perspective as well as the individual personality traits of the puppy(ies) available.

I am always concerned about a new home sticking so I try to talk with them about lifestyles as well. I do think there are differences but each puppy's personality can make a big difference. I try to make a careful consideration toward that. --saltaireshelties

There has been a lot of "water under the bridge" on this question for me in 40 years. I have found that about 80% of Sheltie companion owners seem to bond best with doggy members of the opposite sex, right from first sight. I wonder if it's behavioral or hormonal, or what! If a woman comes to look at two pet puppies, one of each sex, the odds are high that she will fall for the male, and if a man comes to look at the same puppies, it's likely that he will take a shine to the female.

Both sexes of Shelties make equally good pets, in my opinion, so I do recommendations on an individual-Sheltie/individual person basis, trying to match up personalities, lifestyle, and expectations.

With some breeds, males are more feisty and more likely to wander, and females are more gentle and home-centered, but I think in Shelties the temperament differences between the sexes are insignificant. It probably has something to do with the herding heritage, as both sexes of herding dogs are expected to be bonded with their owner, protective of their flock, and gentle with young livestock. #### Fetch 'Em Peanut Butter Balls

cup coarsely crushed rice cereal
 cup smooth peanut butter
 tablespoon honey or molasses

2 tablespoons wheat germ

#### **Instructions:**

In a small bowl, combine cereal, peanut butter, and honey or molasses; stir until mixture forms a ball.

Scoop out teaspoonfuls of mixture and roll into 1-inch balls. (Balls can be rolled smaller or larger to suit the size of your dog.) Roll balls in wheat germ to cover. Store in an airtight container in refrigerator up to 2 weeks.
